






Recommendation	<p>To allocate the funds to each CSP based on the new formula of 60% crime and 40% population. Is the decision of significant public interest	Yes – Overall CSP funding remains at the same level as it has for seven years in order to support the vital work of the Community Safety Partnerships (CSPs). The redistribution of funds based on a formula illustrates the Commissioner's commitment to the whole county and underlines ongoing commitment to Community Safety
Summary of reasons for decision	CSPs are made up of representatives from the police, local authorities, fire and rescue authorities, health and probation services (the 'responsible authorities'). The responsible authorities work together to protect their local

	communities from crime and to help people feel safe. PCCs and CSPs have a reciprocal duty to work together to reduce crime and disorder. The allocation of these funds enables the CSPs to work on their priorities.
